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
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




AN ILLUMINATION OF THE SOUL



THE ART OF THINKING


Philosophy. New subject in the first year of high school. I still remember my friends' warnings: it's a nonsense subject, and the exams are difficult to understand. The usual stuff.

MATHS

The importance of Mathematics

"It is red" people say,





DRAW THE FUTURE

As we all know, the school year is ending and I would like to leave a bit of my experience in the subject of technical drawing. I am going to explain from my point of view, how the subject taught by our teacher Mario has been.

First of all, I have to say that when I chose this modality, I did not expect it to be as it has turned out to be. I did not know there were so many things to learn. Throughout this school year, I have realized that we have given a wide variety of content. In the first term, we started learning geometry and tangents, which was nice but it did not get so much my attention; in the second term we started learning diedric and axonometric system, which was my favourite part of the content; and in the third term, we continued with geometry, conical elements, some more of axonometric system and standardization of technical drawing.

It may all sound very technical and complex, since this subject has a reputation for being so, but I have realized that, at least for me, it has not been; in fact, it has been one of the subjects that I liked the most in this school year.

As for my classmates and teacher, I have to say that I have enjoyed sharing this subject with them, and even if one of us changes the modality next year, I am very happy to have spent this school year with them. For all these reasons, technical drawing has become one of my favorite subjects and I hope that there will be more students in the next promotion year interested in it.

THE VALUE OF PROJECTS IN ENGLISH LESSONS

This school year, as part of the new Education Law, we had to add a new string to our bow in our English lessons: **THE FAMOUS LEARNING SITUATIONS!**

We, your teachers, had to think up and design new ways of evaluating competences in your learning. Thus, we set two projects per term, always thinking of ways to link them to the contents we were covering in our English lessons. These projects not only served as a means to reinforce language skills but also promoted critical thinking, creativity, collaboration and cultural understanding.

In the first term we watched the film JOKER in class, and we reflected on the issues which arise in the movie. After watching, students had to answer a QUIZ focusing on the main scenes from the film, learn how to write a review and produce an essay giving their opinions on all the subtopics portrayed in the movie, with special focus on themes relating to mental health. The second project made students take an active role in their learning by preparing a lesson plan and delivering it in class. In doing so, students developed multiple skills as well as becoming active participants in their own education.

For the second term we asked our students to read a novel: "The Outsiders" by S.E. Hilton. After reading, they were presented with a different task in which they had to write a reflection on the differences and similarities between the rival gangs depicted in the story. They were also asked to create a poster raising awareness about a social issue presented in the story and an analysis of a poem, 'Nothing Gold Can Stay' by Robert Frost.

During the third term we concentrated on music and asked our students to produce more fun and engaging activities. For the first project, together with a partner, they had to create a 15-minute podcasttalking about a topic they related to and for the second one they analysed a music album of their choice and chose 10 songs for their all-time favourite playlist.

Incorporating projects into English lessons has had numerous advantages for language learning development. These projects helped students actively use and improve their language skills, fostered critical thinking and creativity and increased motivation. By providing our students with the opportunity to apply their knowledge and skills in different ways, not by simply sitting exams, teachers have been able to create dynamic learning experiences that make students become confident users of the English language. Here is to many more years of continuing to work in this manner.

Of the empty and useless years of the rest, with the rest me intertwined,


The question, O me! so sad, recurring—What good amid these, O me, O life?
